1. For Plato in the *Republic*, what parts does the psyche have? Why does Plato think these are separate parts?
2. According to *Republic*, why is the just person *always* happier than the unjust person, *even* if the former is never rewarded for his or her just behavior, and the latter never punished for his or her unjust behavior?
3. Explain the difference between consequentialist and non-consequentialist ethics. Give and explain examples.
4. Explain the difference between reductive and eliminative materialism.
